During our morning worship service April 17 the Rev. Jeff Roper announced that after seven years in Latimer's pulpit he had been reappointed by the SC Conference Bishop the Rev. Jonathan Holston to a church in the Charleston District. June 19 will be Jeff's last Sunday to preach and worship with us. God gave Latimer a special gift when he sent Jeff to us. The Rev. Roper's leadership, preaching, musical talent, and many other skills have blessed our church greatly. We thank Jeff for all that he has done for Latimer Memorial. Jeff, Jennie, and Megan have become a part of our church family and all three of them will be missed greatly.

Bishop Holston has appointed our pulpit to be filled by the Rev. William Wallace Culp III who asks that he be called Wally. The Rev. Culp has a Masters of Divinity from Wesley Theological Seminary and is currently a Provisional Elder and will be ordained a full Elder at Annual Conference. He is currently serving the Bethlehem-Jordan Charge in Manning, SC. Being a United Methodist pastor is Wally's second career as he was a practicing attorney for twenty-five years. The Rev. Culp and his wife Ellisa have been married for 28 years and they have two children, a son William and a daughter Catherine. The Culp's call Greenville their hometown.

Wally has asked that I relay this message to the Latimer congregation: "Ellisa and I look forward to becoming part of the community and ministry of Latimer Memorial. We are excited about being part of what you are doing as a church body. We put great value in family and friends and will enjoy getting to know you."

As we look forward to having a new pastor to lead us let us not forget that we are disciples of Jesus Christ and our purpose in the future under Wally Culp's leadership is to lead others to become disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world just as it has been under Jeff Roper's leadership.

From The Pastor:

Just One More Thing...



That is the catch line from the old TV show, Columbo. In law enforcement, I often found myself assuming the role of John Wayne at times. Other times, I was Clint Eastwood, or even Barney Fife. I adapted my persona to bring the best possible result in situations when dealing with suspects and victims.

Very often, when investigating crimes, I would play the role of Columbo. I found using the same tactics Peter Falk used in the old TV series of wearing down suspects by pondering aloud pieces of evidence often brought confessions. If you recall, Columbo often would start to walk away, then turn around and say, "Just one more thing..." He would follow with a puzzle or thought that would cause the

suspect to wonder if they were about to be caught...and they always were caught by Columbo!

When reading the letters of the Apostle Paul, I notice he almost always has final words to add. His way of saying, "Just one more thing..." In these final words he would offer encouragement, some poignant advice, or admonishment on the importance of coexisting as the body of Christ.

In Romans 16:17 he says, "I urge you, brothers, to watch out for those who cause divisions and put obstacles in your way that are contrary to the teaching you have learned. Keep away from them."

Certainly these words are good instruction for us today. If we are to be Christlike, we must surely do so with love and in unity. The importance of harmony in the body is vital if we are to be effective in all God calls us to do. I talked with an unchurched man the other day who said he had been recently invited to church but the "Christian" who invited him complained so much about the church he was inviting him to, it talked him right out of visiting. Remember people are always watching us, trying to reconcile our words, deeds, and attitudes against what we profess to believe.

Jesus said in Matthew 7:16, "By their fruit you will recognize them." Paul wrote in his closing of I Corinthians (16:22) "If anyone does not love the Lord—a curse be on him. Come, O Lord." In II Corinthians 13, he said to "Aim

for perfection...to be of one mind, live in peace. And the God of love will be with you."

In his letter to the Church at Colosse, Paul concluded in 4:2-5 "Devote yourselves to prayer, being watchful and thankful. And pray for us, too, that God may open a door for our message, so that we may proclaim the mystery of Christ, for which I am in chains. Pray that I may proclaim it clearly, as I should. Be wise in the way you act toward outsiders; make the most of every opportunity. Let your conversation be always full of grace, seasoned with salt, so that you may know how to answer everyone."

I truly have been blessed to minister alongside you these past years and thank God for all he is going to do through you in the future. In a very few weeks, we will part ways, geographically speaking, but remember, we are still side by side in building God's Kingdom! We take you with us in our hearts. As my family and I go now to serve in another community, we ask you to hold us in your prayers. May God always richly bless you until we see one another with Christ in final victory!

And just one more thing.... Love one another deeply, serve God always, be faithful to the assembly, and resist the dividing voice of Satan. God loves you and so do we! --- Jeff







A More Excellent Way: Making Space for God to Work.

The big picture

"Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the **Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit**, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."—Matthew 28: 19-20

"You've got to see the bigger picture!" Frankly, I do not know who is given credit for this phrase, but it shares a significant insight.

There is a story attributed to Peter Drucker that speaks to the aspect of seeing the bigger picture; namely: "One day a traveler walking along a lane came across three stonecutters working in a quarry. Each was busy cutting a block of stone. Interested to find out what they were working on, he asked the first stonecutter what he was doing. He replied, 'I am cutting a stone.' Still no wiser,

the traveler turned to the second stonecutter and asked him what he was doing. He said, 'I am cutting this block of stone to make sure that it's square and its dimensions are uniform, so that it will fit exactly in its place in a wall.' A bit closer to finding out what the stonecutters were working on but still unclear, the traveler turned to the third stonecutter who seemed to be the happiest of the three. When asked what he was doing, the third stonecutter replied, 'I am building a cathedral!'

"All three were doing the same thing and knew how to do their job. What set the third stonecutter apart was that he could see the bigger picture."

Indeed, this recognition that we are a part of a larger picture broadens our understanding of a global landscape, which includes our local community, city, state, nation and world. While community in a local church is an essential element of our faith, we also share membership in a larger denomination with districts, annual conferences, jurisdictions and a worldwide church body. In fact, we are connected together in ways that bring both challenge and celebration. This special bond is called "the connection." This connectedness allows us to do more together than can be done individually. We are part of a much bigger picture!

As you receive this edition of the *Advocate*, The United Methodist Church is sharing with its global community at the 2016 General Conference session May 10-20.

Delegates (lay and clergy) representing 131 annual

conferences from around the world will assemble in Portland, Oregon, for a time of prayer and planning to guide the UMC for years to come.

The 2016 General Conference theme, "Therefore Go," is based on the Great Commission and serves as a support for our mission to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. It is an expression of our ministry, which makes space for us to give of our time, talent, gifts, service and witness.

I invite all United Methodists in South Carolina to stand with other United Methodist congregations around the world to pray for the following: 1) the leadership of the General Conference as they organize the work that takes place daily, 2) the delegates who have come from around the world to worship, pray, consider legislation, fellowship and praise God for all that needs to be accomplished in this gathering, 3) the bishops who are faithfully presiding in this time of Christian conferencing, 4) the boards, agencies, translators, volunteers and guests who are tirelessly attending to the details and needs, and 5) the city of Portland, which serves as the host city, in providing a wonderful experience for all.

While we recognize not every United Methodist from South Carolina will be in Portland, the bigger picture is that all of us can engage in prayer for God's will to shape the future of our church. This is a time that we can pray diligently and stay alert with our eyes wide open in gratitude.
